From the ever weird but brilliant thought of Yoko Taro, of Drakengard and NieR fame, comes SINOALICE, a mobile RPG with a dark fairytale spin. Published by Square Enix, SINOALICE is a mobile gotcha game, similar to Fire Emblem Heroes, with beautiful art and lots to collect. Every character is someone familiar from fairy tales, like Alice, Snow White, Little Red Riding Hood, and so on. Those characters each have their own stories through which you progress, aiming to revive the author of each character's story. Of course, this is a free-to-play game published by Square Enix, there are large amounts of microtransactions for in-game currency to go around. They're not as in your face as other games on this list, but you've been warned. Oh, and there's a NieR Automata cross-over event coming up and a RepliCant one coming up later this year. SINOALICE is free-to-play RPG with beautiful art, interesting and thoughtful stories, amazing music, and a fun combat system. The only downside is the microtrons actions. We don't often see staggering releases between Android and iOS these days, but Sky: Children of Light took almost a year to get on the former. Good thing too, because it's a really fun game. It's worth installing as nothing but enjoying the beautiful art style, beautiful world and relaxing adventure. It's hard to describe Sky, but I'll try to be concise. After some time with the game, it's obvious that the focus is on exploration and socialising. Your goal is to find lost stars and guide them home to their constellations; in return, they teach you new things. There no fights in Sky so anyone can feel free to jump in and enjoy without any tension. It's a very relaxing game with a lot to do for composers and lots of see for casual gamers. Sky's biggest draw is its art style, world design and play, all of which are simply stunning. Your character features a winged cape kind of thing you use to fly, slide and get to places your simple jump can't. The set pieces on display here are second to none on Android, evoking such a sense of wonder that I almost forgot to grab screenshots. It also has a few different graphical options, but I chose to run it at 60fps to make sure what I saw move as smoothly as possible. Overall, I would say the biggest mistake with Sky is that it's a lot of taxes on your phone. My OnePlus 6 heated like crazy and my Pixel 4 XL wasn't much better off. There are also microtrons actions to buy candles, which is an important in-game item. There's also an in-game currency called Hearts, which is how you buy cosmetic for your character. I've already put in a few hours and I haven't done a penny so they're not needed or in your face whatsoever. Sky is a beautiful adventure made by the developers of Journey. Despite some of the usual free-to-play pitfalls, it's a very valuable experience. I've had trouble choosing just one classic RPG for this list since we have several to choose from. Finally, I went for this list with Knights of the Old Republic, better known as KOTOR. For one, Star Wars is a hugely popular franchise and I think it's a game worth

playing if you enjoy that universe. Originally created by BioWare in its heyday, KOTOR is a fantastic story. Go beyond that, I fear I'll get in spoilers, so I'll leave it to you. KOTOR is considered one of the best RPGs of all time and I'll be hard-pressed to disagree. Ported to Android thanks to the people at Aspyr, KOTOR has new life on mobile and though it might be an expensive price to enter, it's worth every penny. From the story to the fighting, that and his sequel are certainly the best Star Wars games ever made. There is gamepad support, achievements, and a revamped UI designed specifically for touchscreens. It's an excellent port and I haven't encountered any mistakes in the years I've played it. If you like Star Wars, do yourself a favor and check out KOTOR. A classic RPG that is considered one of the best of all time, KOTOR is a great game reimaged for mobile. It's worth getting the asking price to a fantastic story and an excellent game. Titan Quest originally came back in 2006 and helped fill the long void left by Diablo II before III came out. It's an isometric ARPG with tons of booty, monsters to kill, and stunning views to see. And while there's still a community around it left on PC thanks to THQ Nordic's Titan Quest Anniversary Edition, Android users can have this gem of the game of a port experienced from a few years ago. You are an unnamed hero, freshly landed on the shores of Helos in Greece, a village currently besieged by wild animals and monsters of fairy tales and folklore. Once you save the town, you sit looking for the famous Leonidas and I'll the rest for you to discover. Spoiler: you're going to see a lot of the ancient world. This game is many hours long, action-packed, and full of spoils to find. Within a few hours of starting, you'll have a hero powerful enough to kill anything in your path, while looking completely awesome. Titan Quest features a dual specialty building system, meaning you can combine any two of the disciplines to create your own demi-god. If spoilers are half the fun of Titan Quest, the other is definitely finding the build to suit your style of play. I would say that this port of Titan Quest has two major drawbacks. For starters, it's not a port of the Anniversary Edition and so lacks all the new content (extra specialties and extensions) and quality of life improvements. Secondly, there is no controller support and the touch controls can feel a little wonky on points. Still, it's a mostly good haven of one of my favorite games of all time and it definitely deserves a spot in this list. This classic ARPG was transferred to Android a few years ago and it's worth every penny. If you like ancient mythology, hack-and-slash ARPG game, and tons of looting, this game is definitely one you should pick up. Sometimes, your opinion just isn't aligned with everyone else's and it's good at times. Such is the case here with V4. I game I really enjoyed, but had a ton of angry 1-star reviews in the Play Store at the time of writing. I have dumped nearly 10 hours into this game at this point and I disagree with a lot of disparaging, since most of it seems to be due to technical launch issues, such as server and character creation problems. Published by Nexon, I was on guard and somewhat suspicious going into V4. I ended up pleasantly surprised. V4 is a dark fantasy MMO that has beautiful art, nice graphics, a decent character creator, 6 classes to choose from, and your choice between auto-playing (a la diaper clickers) or manual game, like a traditional MMO. However, the voice acting and dialogue are both pretty cringeworthy and I don't enjoy most of the sound effects. My Gunslinger's double pistols and gun should bleed, not sounding like they're slapping the enemies, for example. Otherwise, this is your typical MMO rate. You have a character level that determines your metrics, levels for additional metrics that you can sacrifice gear to increase, and various daily missions and achievements to complete. There are different mountains for you to show off and different pets that offer extra bonuses, such as XP increases. I wouldn't say V4 is groundbreaking as an MMO, but being mobile and free-to-play, I quite like it. With that just launched, some teething issues should be expected. Some players have reported (via 1-star reviews) login issues, full servers, and difficulty spinning the character creator. In my playing time, I never had a single problem. Despite a name that would imply a sci-fi environment, V4 is actually a dark fantasy MMO. Although there were launch issues, V4 features 6 classes to choose explore a beautiful world, and many MMO times to do. Fans of the World of Darkness IP vampire: The Masquerade has a lot to be excited for. As we wait patiently on Bloodlines 2, we have something to surrender us. Called Night Road, this game is a 100% text-based RPG where your choices matter. It also helps that the writing is awesome and the game itself is great at 650,000 words (give or take). In Night Road, you play as a vampire courier driving through the American Southwest to deliver goods and messages to vampire higher-ups. Not only are vampire hunters after you, but you have to contend with the dawn if you make your way to your destination. Ultimately, though, you define your character as you see fit. Considering the size of the game and the multitude of choices you can make, Night Road is an excellent text-based adventure and one that's fun to play through several times to see how different choices influence the narrative. You can start playing for free, but at some point, you need to fork over \$10 to finish the game. You can also pay \$1- to remove ads. Survive the rising sun and persistent vampire hunters in a fresh take on text-based RPGs. This game sports a ton of excellent writing, and meaningful choices that affect the game. Wayward Souls has been around for a while, but boy is this a big game. It's either a rogue-like with ARPG elements, or it's an ARPG with rogue-like elements. Both are equally valid, I think, though I tend to fall into the former camp. What's actually important, though, is that Wayward Souls is a great game and an absolute must for any fan of rogue-likes and/or ARPGs. You find yourself in a strange tower and you get a choice: are you playing as the magic, the crook, or the warrior? The goal is to achieve the exit from each level, but it can often be extremely difficult or super easy depending on your luck of the draw and your skill. Each level is generated procedurally, so your spoils, layout and enemy placement will be different every time. This game is very difficult, don't get me wrong, but I think the problems are done pretty well. You don't have to handle finicky touchscreen controls — quite the opposite, really — and the game teaches you the basics. Because of the procedural generation, there can't be quite a sharp increase in challenge, but you'll be alright. This game is just awesome. From the beautiful style of art to the challenging game, Wayward Souls is hard roge - APRG that will push the limits of your skill. From first-person immersion to third-person top-down, these games are filled with action and bullets. What else should I say? Call of Duty Mobile There was a ton of hype Call of Duty Mobile throughout the beta and before its global launch, and to the credit of Activision and TIMI Studios (a subsidiary of Tencent Games) it is phenomenal and is rightly chosen as one of the best mobile games released in 2019 — and it's only still getting better in 2020. In the latest update, it now offers an outstanding new 20 vs. 20 Battle Royale mode called Warfare. A big reason why the game playing so well can be credited to Tencent Games. It owns the mobile shooter space with PUBG Mobile, another game that's on this list, and fans of that game will recognize the familiar user interface and surprising game performance that's perfectly optimized for mobile. CoD Mobile uses the many iconic multiplayer cards of the Call of Duty franchise and really does a great job translating the quick action that makes the game so fun to play on other platforms. Call of Duty Mobile features the core team of deathmatch modes that Call of Duty is known for collaborating with the Battle Royale mode which was introduced in the main franchise with CoD: Black Ops 4. They could easily just get stuck with the team death ascension and still have a big game on their hands, but the inclusion of a 100-player battle royale (along with the fan-favorite zombie mode) only adds more value to the total package. I've been playing CoD Mobile since the beta and it's been one of my go-to games when I have a few minutes to kill. Because the game is so damn popular, it's super fast to jump into a game, whether you want to play with being comfortable or going against more veteran players in a position game. Because it's a free-to-play game, there's the usual tranquility, including in-app purchases for buying in-game currency, which can then be spent on battle crates filled with random rewards, and a tiered progression path with premium subscriptions available for just more rewards. Considering the console or computer versions of Call of Duty will set you back at least \$60 upfront, along with all the ultimate paid DLC and inevitable microtran transactions for cosmetic upgrades, the mobile version ultimately feeling better in terms of up-front value. You don't have to bust out your credit card to thoroughly enjoy this game - which is a big reason call of Duty Mobile demands the top spot on our list. Call of Duty won Game of the Year Awards for 2019 for good reason. This is a surprisingly full version of Call of Duty for phones that are completely free to play. That's right, it's the grandfather of the first-person shooter and his awesome and equally as powerful sequel. Both of these games more than earn a spot on this list not only for their timelessness, but because the Android ports are really very good. Bethesda has fixed many of the early issues, including removing the Bethesda.net account requirement and customizing the touchscreen controls, and now I can recommend both games warmly. I still suggest using a controller if you can, however. Doom is nearly 30 years old and boy, it becomes the test of the Resist. Like other 90s classics, Doom and Doom II were true passion projects, games that envelope at the time. While not technically impressive today - Doom can run on a pregnancy test - they maintain their charm, character, and near-flawless play. Cover it all off with an update that brought support for 16:9 resolutions and 90-120 frames per second and you have yourself a very fine duology of shooters. Although others in this section are pushing what's possible on mobile today, Doom and Doom II just chug along, providing joyful nostalgia to those of us who have played them in our younger years or giving younger gamers a chance to experience video game history. The king of classic first-person shooters, Doom introduced us to Doom Guy, a badass many of us have loved ever since. Kill demons as you collect different weapons and trudge your way through the base levels, additional content, and challenges. The sequel to the iconic Doom, Doom II sees you take the mantle of Doom Guy again as he goes to hunt down demon. Like Doom, there's a lot to do and see, and a lot of enemies to take off. What no introduction needs is one of the most popular games available in the world in the Play Store. Love it or hate it, Fortnite is now easier for everyone to jump in on their phones without allowing third-party installations. So even though you've been able to play Fortnite on Android for over a year, we thought it belonged here on this list now more than ever. Odds are you either know about Fortnite on your own or you know someone who's in it. Although many have tried to unlaigate it, it remains a juggernaut in the gambling world. Its free-to-play nature combined with its cartoonish graphics and simple game loop helps explain why it's so popular; it's easy to play, but hard to master applying is why so many find it enjoyable. Infinity Ops is a sci-fi multiplayer shooter that is, well... it's really awesome. I played this game for hours and I love every minute of it. It's a great time and fun for the whole family — I love cards against humanity, but it's not exactly the most child-friendly game out there. Exploding Kittens is a mere \$2 purchase and it's yours for good. You can also play online with strangers. Draw cards until someone pulls the Exploding Kitten Card. Hopefully it's not you, otherwise you have to defuse the cat before you get knocked out the game! Gwent has been around for a few years now. There's a lot more to it than that, but the nuance is simply too much for this list. It's one of those great free-to-play games that I'm guessing you're trying. Even if you're not in League of Legends, Legends of Runeterra are a nice break from Hearthstone while you still feel familiar. The tutorial introduces the game well, so give it like half an hour and you'll be good to go. Dive into Riot Games' answer to Hearthstone, which is in the League of Legends universe.
